BUDDY MENTOR - ROLE DESCRIPTION

Term:	1 Academic Year (1st September- 30th June)
Expected Commitment:	5 hours per week (Term-time)

TRAINING

Successful candidates will be required to undertake an induction with members of the Buddy Scheme Committee and SU staff. This will cover everything you need to know to be a Buddy; an introduction to the Union, how to go about your role, diversity training and how to access funding.

SKILLS/INTERESTS

During your time in the role we expect that you will develop the following skills that will contribute towards your own personal development, volunteer hours and the Employability Plus award:

MAIN ACTIVITIES

- Support and mentor up to 3 international students a term (totalling up to 6 in an academic year)
- Meet with each mentee on a 1-2-1 basis in public places.
- Email mentee before they arrive in Northampton and during their time here.
- Discuss with them how they are settling in, and guide/sign post them to support when needed. Ensure effective communication with them regarding all buddy events.
- Must submit reports for each 1-2-1 meeting that takes place.



- Support the Buddy Scheme committee in organising and planning events, and recruiting for new Buddy Mentors.
- Actively take part in all Buddy events/activities
- Promote the Buddy Scheme during International Orientation and Fresher's Weeks; activities could include staffing stalls, induction presentations or handing out promotional materials.

COMMITMENT & LOCATION

- This is a very flexible volunteer role; that enables you to fit your volunteering around your existing commitments and academic work. It provides a great deal of autonomy and opportunity for increasing responsibility. Typically, we would expect an average commitment of 3 hours per week; however this fluctuates over the year.
- You will need to notify the Buddy Scheme coordinator of when and where you are meeting your buddies.
- The role will take place in a location of you and your international buddy own choosing (providing it is a public place), however the resources of the Students' Union building are available for the International Buddy Scheme members. Talk to the committee or the Member Development Manager in order to make specific room booking requests on campus.

WHAT YOU'LL GET OUT OF IT

- The opportunity to develop the skills outlined in the section above
- Access to a tailored training programme to support your development
- Recognition of your commitment through the University's Employability Plus Award
- Access to funding and resources to support your chosen student activity
- Sense of achievement of making a real difference to the lives of those who have moved to the UK to studying on campus
- The opportunity to work with many interesting people within our student community
- Able to draw on your experience and skills gained for future job applications and CV.

RECRUITMENT PROCESS

Buddies are recruited through an application process throughout the year, and are expected to attend a compulsory 2 hour training. This training is used as part of the selection processes to see how you interact with other students. After the training if you were successful you will be formally invited to be a Buddy.
